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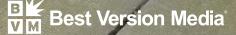

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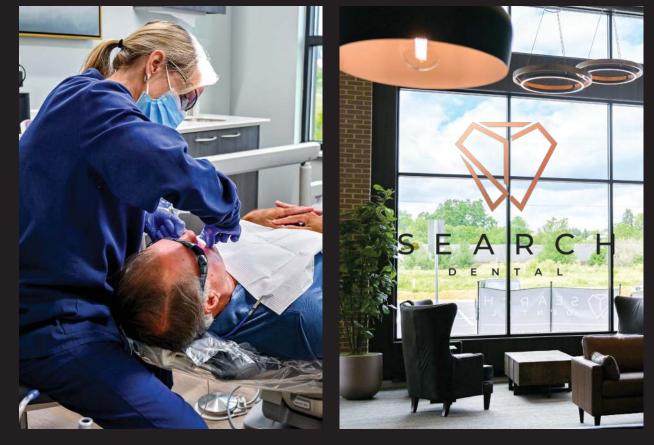

HOW CV GIRLS LACROSSE COACH LED HER TEAM TO THE MID PENN PLAY OFFS AND MADE COMMONWEALTH COACH OF 2023

"My identity was wrapped up in being an athlete my whole life. Even after college, I got married, started teaching, and immediately was coaching," begins Coach Karen Keitel. "But then I started



raising a family and I felt like I needed to put it all aside for a season. I needed to make a clean break to find out who I was without the sports. I focused on raising kids and whatever came along that way."

First-year head coach, for CV Varsity Girls Lacrosse, Karen Keitel reflects on her past and how she got to be Mid-Penn Commonwealth Coach of the Year.

Even as she laid down her own athletic goals, to focus on her family, sports found her one way or another. "I would end up volunteering for something, dabbling in whatever sport the kids were involved in. Whether it was basketball, soccer, field hockey, track, or whatever, I would just do one season at a time. I wanted to make it fun for the kids. I wanted the kids to have a good experience and enjoy it."

As the kids grew and their interests began to vary, Karen did what many moms do, she looked for avenues in which she could help. Coaching lacrosse really came out of a place of necessity. "My daughter, Anna, started picking it up. Slowly I started filling in. I had been away from lacrosse for so long and so much of the game had changed, that I thought I didn't even really know the sport anymore." she remembers.

As her daughter continued to grow in her love for the sport, a coaching position



was needed for the middl school girls. Soon after the JV team needed a control. As it turned out, like mother, like daughter, that year Anna made Varsity and Karen didn't even coach her. "She really did have her own experience with lacrosse, after all."

When her daughter graduated high school, Karen had planned to tell the kids at the end of the season that she too, was quitting.

But then the head coach announced that she was done. The team and school asked Karen if she would consider being the head coach. "Again, I went back to my family and asked them if they were good with this idea. I know how I get. I know I can be tunnel-visioned and focused. But my family was all in. They encouraged me to do it."

Last summer she watched film after film after film, of the team. She then gathered her seniors, all 10 of them, and sat them down. "I asked them, what kind of team did they want. I told them I was going to rely on them to set the tone. This is who the rest of the team would take their cues from. We decided that we wanted to keep practices fun, games uplifting, and to have authentic team trust."

Keitel continued, "There was a level of pushing that I didn't need to do. First, the prior coach had already set the bar high. Frankly, she laid the groundwork and had many great ideas that I was able to implement. Second, these kids are very, very high-achieving kids. They already put a level of stress on themselves, consistently looking for excellence. What I wanted them to hear, was that they didn't need to be perfect and I wanted them to have fun."

Keitel made the choice to try to change the culture by asking the team of girls to trust her enough to prepare them and trust her enough to be able to execute

the directions she was giving them. She then pushed the students to have confidence in each other. One way they were able to build that faith was by pairing an older student with a younger student. This was called Stick Sisters. Every Monday, each pair would check in with one another to see how the other was doing. They also did things like run together during warm-ups. This was one of the ways the coach was able to help break down natural divisions and barriers between the girls.

"We also had accountability pods, which included a girl from each grade, attackers, defenders, you name it. We wanted to mix it up so that the girls continued to see each other as a team," Keitel shared.

Her focus not only included team mentality but also to be content with whatever role they had on that team. "I wanted the kids to embrace whatever role they were playing on any given day, 100%. They could be a sub, a starter, or a sideline encourager but the whole team benefits, together. Every girl has a place on the team, a purpose."

Before games, the team would gather

together and just start speaking out loud about the positives that they would do in the game ahead. Game time became



a place of encouragement. "At first they were afraid of failing, but it didn't matter if they made mistakes. Everyone does. What matters is how you respond and how you pick each other up."

Keitel and the team kept things fun. They had Wacky Wednesdays, dress-up day, an easter egg hunt, and even lacrosse olympics. Teams dressed up with all sorts of fun ideas. "One team did a Shrek theme, which was impressive because it was in May and it was hot!"

The extras like team dinners, secret handshakes, and "Bucket Hat Winners," all added to the atmosphere within the team. Over the course of the year, the connections built the trust and the team was both successful on and off the field.

"You know, I am competitive but I know that is not the end all. When you prioritize people and treat them with respect, you teach others that you care. Those girls know that I do care. To journey with these girls and have those connections and if I am able to help them in good, hard, or stressful times - well, then I have been successful."

And that's how Coach Karen Keitel led her team to the Mid-Penn conference and district playoffs and became the Commonwealth Lacrosse Coach of 2023, all in one year.

INTRODUCING CUMBERLAND OMT

This new to the area specialty service will help patients with many

oral dysfunctions. OMT stands for Orofacial Myofunctional Therapy. It is the study of the facial muscles and skeletal structures and how they work harmoniously to have healthy lip, tongue, and jaw posture. An Oral Myofunctional Disorder (OMD) can affect many areas of a person's health including poor sleep, speech, teeth alignment, breathing, and even ADHD. Additionally, treatment can help with facial aesthetics and even possibly shorten the duration of orthodontic treatment.

"I love treating my patients comprehensively and looking at the entire picture to help them with overall



health and well-being," explains hygienist and OMT therapist, Ashley Nell. "My goal is to educate my patients on good oral health, but there is so much more than just another set of teeth to clean! Once I found OMT I was amazed by the fact that I can help young patients grow and develop with proper function and help my adult patients simply feel better about themselves or relieve pain that they never got a cause or reason for. I knew I wanted to be a part of that puzzle piece for them."

This non-invasive, holistic treatment could help revert symptoms that people have been living with for a lifetime. Working with patients from age four all the way to the elderly, OMT has been proven to enhance quality of life, with everyday life-sustaining skills.

"There are infinite examples of how OMT can help people! Think about things like mouth breathing, tongue ties, crooked teeth, thumb sucking, oral habits, even sleep apnea," Cindy Santiago, a dental hygienist and now an oral-facial myofunctional therapist, describes.

"Some children may be misdiagnosed with ADHD, but actually have an OMD that is contributing to their symptoms. It could be very beneficial to have kids with ADHD assessed. Children who don't sleep well tend to have a lack of focus and can be hyperactive. There is a chance their symptoms could be lessened," she points out.

"You can't put a price on a parent's peace of mind when knowing that their

child is sleeping well and getting along with their peers."

True to the Verber style, the team works with other specialties. With a consultation and diagnosis, a therapist can then make referrals, if needed, to other professionals such as chiropractors, speech therapists, oral surgeons, and more. The team is excited to work with other multi-disciplinary professionals. "We are just one part of the team but working with other specialists will help us to treat our patients more effectively," Santiago shares.

Another aspect of this therapy is cosmetic. "Our treatment can change someone's self-esteem. Consider a person who has an open bite or breathes with their mouth open. When they have that corrected, they shine brighter!"

Cindy shares a testimony of a young woman who had trouble drinking out of a cup. "We identified that she had a tongue thrust and couldn't seal her lips well. She was so self-conscious, especially when out in public. However, we've been able to utilize various therapies to help correct the thrust. This is the value that we can give to people in these everyday struggles."

"When you are healthy, more selfconfident, you are happier and feel as though you are living a more fulfilled life."

Currently, there is no other OMT service in the local community, with the closest therapist in York. The team is excited to serve the population in the Cumberland Valley area and knows that this specialty will benefit speech therapy as well. "We already have patients that have been in speech therapy for a long time and are in dire need of OMT. Speech therapists are dying to have us in the area so that we can collaborate together on a patient's health!"

TREATMENT IN THREE PHASES

Step 1 - Beginning with a consultation, the team will do an evaluation to determine if OMT is a good fit. This also includes any referrals that may be needed.

Step 2 - Next a custom therapy program is created. Using data, photos, measurements, and patient explanation, the team tailors the exercises first on individual muscles, then groups of



muscles, and finally habituation. Habit elimination is an important part of the process. However, the team has seen success within 15 days, specifically with a compliant patient.

Step 3 - Begin Treatment. Typically a patient will meet with the therapist once a week for a half-hour session. This one-on-one teaching builds rapport and relationships with the patients. The team is able to evaluate the competency of the exercises each week. A typical treatment takes 3-6 months.

PASSIONATE. INFORMED. SPECIALIZED.

The team of 3, Cindy Santiago, Ashley Nell, and Maria Eisenhart are excited to bring this new treatment option to the area. A big portion of this endeavor also includes the opportunity to educate other professionals. "There has not always been a good blend between the medical community and the educational professionals. If we can share this with parents, educators, and counselors then maybe we could assist kids in getting the help they need. We want to be a piece of the team. I think OMT could be another one of those opportunities," Maria Eisenhart voices.

Education was the way that Cindy Santiago was able to convince the team of doctors within the Verber group to move forward with this idea. "This all started about a year and a half ago. I went to Dr. Verber and shared with him my idea. I knew what this group thinks, the idea of having a complete dental health system. I was able to then do a presentation with the entire team by focusing on how OMT could help a child with ADHD. Honestly, since then, we have had such great support from our doctors. We truly couldn't do this without the Verber group behind us."

As the team worked to become specialized in this very niche field, they learned some interesting things about themselves too! "We realized that we all had some sort of OMD ourselves. Apparently, I don't chew my food well enough and Ashley's tongue is tied!" laughed Maria.

"I've been a dental hygienist for 17 years. I have told my patients for years to brush more often or try a different angle. Now I can identify something as simple as a tongue tie that can help their dental health. We have solutions! We can correct things that we have looked at for years. I love the idea that we can help improve a person's quality of life!' Santiago concludes.

Though we won't ever see the christening of a new Titanic here, we will see thousands of people and pets using and enjoying this launch, including canoers, kayakers, waders, fishermen, inner tubers, and dogs chasing sticks and balls in the creek. The launch has an 8% grade to allow for ADAapproved (for disabled individuals) access to the water.

Like anything worthwhile, this launch took some patience but was worth the wait. Design began in 2020, and construction wrapped up last fall.

Silver Spring Township's Parks and Recreation Department applied for and won a Cumberland County Land Partnership grant to fund half the project. The other half came from matching funds paid by the township. The total cost was about \$30,000.

Board member Shawn Fabian led the design team and managed the project throughout.

The team used a coffer dam to divert creek water away from the construction site. Since the creek level was lower than anticipated due to drought, the project team extended the ramp further into the creek to ensure it will always meet and touch the water.

The team hit bedrock at the creek bottom. So, they drilled into the bedrock, set the rebar, and tied it into the rebar for the boat launch before they poured concrete for the launch. Of its durability, Shawn said,

"That launch should outlive me!"

The ramp is about 15' wide x 100' long. Rip rap rock is installed and secured with grout along both sides of the launch to help prevent erosion.

The PA Department of Environmental Protection issued a joint permit for projects at the DiFilippo Preserve that covered the launch.

Coincidentally, the work on Sample Bridge Road south of the bridge is completed. The road has been open from the Carlisle Pike and over the bridge to the Preserve for a few months.

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BBQ PULLED **CHICKEN SLIDERS**

INGREDIENTS:

- ¹/₂ Cup ketchup
- ¹/₂ Tsp smoked paprika
- 1t dark brown sugar
- ¹/₂ Tsp ground cumin
- 1t cider vinegar
- 1/8 Tsp ground allspice
- ¹/₂ Tsp dry mustard
- 1/2 Tsp onion powder
- 1tsp chilii powder
- 2 Cups shredded rotisserie chicken breast
- ¹/₂ Tsp garlic powder
- 8 Hawaiian rolls
- 6 Pickle chips

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Combine the first 10 ingredients in a saucepan over medium heat. Bring to a simmer.
- 2. Cook for approximately 2 minutes until it turns slightly thick. Add chicken and Cook an additional 2-3 minutes.
- **3.** Spoon 3 t of mixture on the bottom ½ of a hawaiian roll and top with a pickle
